Pastoral Message

Happy March 29th!

January 29th, 1688 mean anything to you? Some sharp-minded New Church people might recall that Emanuel Swedenborg was born on that date. Maybe, if you went to a New Church school, it was not so much your sharp mind that helped you remember, but your childhood taste buds that were delightfully awakened as you bit into a Swedish flag decorated cup cake, given to you on Swedenborg's birthday (yum yum!).

How many New Church People (or "Swedenborgians", as they are often labeled) would you guess know when he died? Swedenborg died on March 29th, 1772, at age 84. You probably didn't remember that because you never were given a cupcake to celebrate his death! Amazingly, he predicted the day he would die months earlier in a letter to a stranger, John Wesley — a theologian Swedenborg only reached out to because spirits had told him John had wanted to talk with him (and they were right)! Also amazingly, Swedenborg had recently traveled to London and was lodging in the home of a wigmaker (that's not the amazing part); he thoughtfully, and perhaps a little eerily, paid his rent well in advance... but only up to what he would owe through March 29th of 1772 (cue eerie music). His maid, as well, told people that he had predicted the time of his passing to the day. Wow! Swedenborg's life is fascinating. Even in his death fantastic but true things happened.

I am not someone who loves being called a "Swedenborgian", much like I wouldn't want to be called a "Swifty" just because I listen to Taylor Swift. However, there is more to it - if I were someone who was idolizing Taylor Swift, I would love to be called a "Swifty", because that would make me feel like I was part of something wonderful, and bigger than myself, that had my idol at its center. But that is not what Swedenborg is to me (or what Swedenborg thought he should be either). Swedenborg is not at our center, the Lord is. So, call me a "Lordy", I guess.

So, what is the importance of Swedenborg and how would I suggest we think of him? Well, to the Lord, he is not any more important than you or me. That doesn't mean that Swedenborg was just a man at the right place at the right time; it was his endless study and his extreme passion that placed him in his position with the Lord. There were bigger factors at play that also helped his placement. The advances in the printing press over the decades made bibles more available, helped spread scientific breakthroughs more quickly, and by the 1700s made it far easier to mass produce any book for a lower cost. This flooding in of

shared information opened the world up to an "Age of Enlightenment" that still allowed for God to be a part of "reason" (the 1800s would usher in a "Scientific Revolution" in which God was not as much a central component to "reason"). The evolution of mass communication, vast exposure to the thinking of so many great minds at the time, propelled what people were conscious of more rapidly than ever before. We can think of Swedenborg as a beautiful flower surrounded by beautiful flowers, in a well-kept garden with rich soil. What set him out was that the Lord pollinated this specific flower (Swedenborg) with more spiritual "pollen" than any other - the seeds from this flower were going to continue to germinate and create new seeds, creating ever more magnificent gardens, forever. The pollen and seeds were never Swedenborg's, he was just the flower that the pollen rested in. They were always from the Lord. *

Also, in order for the Heavenly Doctrines to see life they had to be published by a man of great integri-

ty, well enough known to have a sound and superior mind, and there had to be a little "mystic magic" to give his spiritual claims some legitimacy. He was the right man for the job.

Swedenborg carried out his part in getting out a great work that the Lord gave light to (the Heavenly Doctrines), much like the men who wrote out parts of the New and Old Testament before it. Do we revere Daniel, Ezekiel, Matthew, or John as great authors or leaders? No, we read these works with the knowledge that the Lord Himself commissioned these works and is communicating through the text. The Lord commissioned Swedenborg, just as He had done before, but Swedenborg had a more rational and evolved mind, therefore the revelation was like nothing before. Time will make accepting the Heavenly Doctrines as revelation an easier thing to do for people in the future. We can be grateful we are part of its cultivation and continued growth.

Swedenborg, like any great thinker, should be remembered as someone who helped push forward our understanding of the world around us. The Lord's books that Swedenborg published, unlike those of any great thinker, should be revered and studied endlessly into the future in order to push forward our understanding of the spiritual world around us. There is no problem in celebrating his life in a secular way, much like that of any great thinker. However, if we are to celebrate the man in any religious context, maybe we should celebrate his heavenly birth on March 29th—the day he could finally make his vacation home his permanent address. Imagine his delight when he had fulfilled his duties to the Lord here and knew he could now continue in those uses in true freedom with the Lord in His heavens.
