Pastoral Message

Experimentation

Experimentation is a real thing. Some people love experimenting with things in hopes of discovering something new—a new taste sensation, a new way of exercising, a better way to prevent squirrels from getting to the bird feeder, etc. For some people, in fact, experimentation is a way of life.

Then there are people who like to experiment with things that may not be entirely good for them—they may even be harmful. Experimenting with drugs or alcohol is a good example. Other examples could include experimenting with plagiarism in college, weaving in and out of traffic at high speeds, or any dangerous, risk-taking activity or adventure.

When it comes to unhealthy life practices—which we sometimes call "evils" or "sins"—some people like to experiment with these as well. Some might even say that you "need" to experiment with certain evils and *experience* them before you can realize how truly bad, harmful, and unhealthy they are.

I don't want to take away from an opinion like that. Maybe there really are people or personality types who learn best by experimenting with spiritually harmful behaviors, and who begin to turn away from them in response to painful consequences they experience. At the same time, though, the theology of the New Church suggests that we don't have to actually experience a form of evil to see that it's bad and resist it. We only need to see it as it tries to creep into our hearts and minds to recognize it for what it is, and then cut it off there.

But what I've said so far isn't the point of this article. The point of this article is to do my own (fun) type of experimenting.:) You see, in the 9 ½ years that I've been writing articles for Park News—56 of them including this one—I haven't heard anyone mention or comment on any of them. Not only that, but in all the time I've been in Glenview, I never heard anyone comment on an article that Peter Buss Jr. wrote when he was pastor, or that Jay Barry wrote during his time here, or that Mac Frazier penned during his stint in Glenview, or that Elmo has written since he arrived.
